Last Month's Stamp Question:

Only one member responded about our question last month. "Dead Countries" what does that mean to a philatelist. How many are there currently? Secretary and member Michael Keil was the only member to respond. He found in *Linn's Glossary of Philatelic Terms*, "A dead country is a former stamp issuing entity that has ceased issuing its own stamps. Also, the old name of an active stamp issuing entity that has changed its name so that the old name will no longer be used on a stamp." Michael wondered, as I do, if this includes the Trucial States? I know that Scott's has never considered them stamp issuing entities, while some of the European catalogues (such as Michel's) do have them in the catalog.

That answers the definition of a dead country but how many are there currently? I don't know and Michael didn't know. Okay, where are all you worldwide collectors? Any one want to count?



Schleswig #12 View of Schleswig One country that is dead and gone is Schleswig, located in the northern part of Schleswig-Holstein Province, in northern Germany. After the Versailles treaty of WWI, Schleswig was divided into North and South Schleswig. In 1920, a vote was taken and North Schleswig voted to join Denmark, South Schleswig voted to stay in Germany. Although Hitler never openly challenged the Danish/German border, it didn't prevent Hitler from invading Denmark in 1940. After WWII nothing really changed, hence it is a "dead country".

A Changing of the Guard:

E and D Stamp Auction changes ownership this summer. Current owner Jim Allen's last auction is Sunday, July 28th. The new owner, Dale Goeller takes over September 1st. I sat down recently with the two of them to talk about the auction house and the transition.

The business started in either 1989 or 1990 as John's Stamps of the World and was owned by John Timmons. The auction part of the business started originally as a mail bid auction, which was monthly. Then in 1999 Ed Myer and Don Kuske acquired the business and renamed the business E and D Stamp Auction. Ed and Don changed it to the business model you see today. Auction catalog and floor auctions several times a year. When they were ready to retire from the day to day stamp business they found a new owner in Jim Allen. He bought the business in January of 2010 and has operated and grown the business over this current decade.

With Jim and his wife Beth wanting to retire and go to Hawaii, he decided to sell the business. In walks former Marine, Army Reservist and retired Navy Supply Corps Officer, Dale Goeller. Dale's background to the stamp world was as a child and only recently as an adult. He had a small collection of Germany as a child, now collects anything "cheap" worldwide and has developed an interest in postal stationary, such as U.S.

Dale doesn't plan on any big changes to the business at first except for one. He plans on moving the business to North Kansas City. He has found a location that is on the ground floor with just two small

> steps up in to the building. The restroom facilities are located on the second floor but two Quick Trips are close by to stop at on your way in or out. Lots of great places to eat near this location also. Just south of Armour Rd and a couple of blocks east of Burlington St., behind the Dollar General. Easy to get to from whatever direction you come from. The new address starting in September will be 1901A Clay St, North Kansas City, MO 64116.

Is the Philatelic World Ready for the Semiguincentennial:

This year marks the 243rd Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, which of course marks this nation's birthday. With the lengthy time it seems to take for the design and issuance of a new stamp, I fear that the U.S.P.S. is behind. For the U.S. Bicentennial, lots of stamps, postal cards and postal stationary was designed and issued from 1971 to 1983.



That first 8c stamp issued for the Bicentennial was in 1971, 5 years before the 200th celebration. If we have a similar schedule for the 250th, we should see something issued on July 4th. 2021. That is only two years away. The City of Philadelphia formed a commission in 2014 to look into hosting the event. A 33 member U.S. commission has been formed and is working on the celebration itself but will it even equal what was done in 1976. Will other stamp issuing entities around the world issue anything at all. There are a few that will cash in as they do on almost every subject. Some issue more stamps each year than they have people on their island.

As a nearly life long collector of the Bicentennial issues from the U.S. and around the world, I would be very disappointed if it is overlooked by all.

Stamp Tip:

In going through a past auction acquisition that had been too long neglected, I needed a Vario page or something to slip a French Postal letter into. I went to my stash. As a collector, I am also a hoarder of philatelic supplies. I really never get rid of anything. I found the size I wanted but another Vario page was stuck to it. An old sticker/label that had either fell off or I pulled off had left a sticky residue on the size I wanted to use. Oh what to do? Remembering that I had the perfect thing to remove that sticky stuff, I went to the cabinet I keep cleaning supplies and pulled off the shelf, Goo Gone.

Dampen a rag lightly with the Goo Gone and rub gently on the surface you wish to clean. Then once removed, take a clean cloth dampened with warm water and wipe any residue away. I let the Vario page dry completely, then slipped in the item and put it into my notebook.

I found years ago this product worked great on removing all kinds of unwanted marks in the store I had. In fact I liked it so much I stocked the item on the variety store shelf. It is somewhat safer than lighter fluid and doesn't discolor some plastics like lighter fluid can. It is still flammable so don't smoke around it. And dispose of your rag properly. I usually rise it out with warm water before throwing the rag out.
