

For the rest of you that can and should exhibit and don't mind your face in the newsletter then get cracking and have an exhibit this next December. Remember an exhibit can become a newsletter article and/or program also!

The International Geophysical Year by Michael Keil:

The International Geophysical Year (IGY) was a year and a half long period of intense global activities with 70 nations cooperating scientifically. The International Council of Scientific Unions oversaw this endeavor which lasted from July 1957 until December 1958. The IGY Program Report stated that the goal was "....to observe geophysical phenomena and to secure data from all parts of the world; to conduct this effort on a coordinated basis by fields, and in a space and time, so that results could be collated in a meaningful manner." The IGY advanced our understanding of the earth, our atmosphere and had a significant effect on the future of the Antarctic Continent.

The IGY was modeled on two previous Polar Years, 1882-83 and 1932-33, where coordinated scientific studies were conducted to understand the earth's natural processes and cycles. The third Polar Year was scheduled for 1982 but Lloyd Berkner, one of the organizers of the IGY, recognized that there would be a significant sunspot cycle between 1957 and 1958 that would be too important to not thoroughly investigate. This cycle, along with advances in technology and the global focus of the project made 1957-58 a period when global understanding could be enhanced on an unprecedented scale. The most significant IGY achievements were:

- Understanding the system of mid-ocean ridges that encircle the globe, furthering our understanding of the earth's crust and the theory of Plate Tectonics.
- Discovery of the Van Allen Radiation Belts. These belts surround the earth at altitudes of hundreds and thousands of kilometers above the surface and are significant to present day electronic communications.
- * Collection of synoptic data, a comprehensive overview of global physical phenomena.


Under the collection of data, special attention was given to the Antarctic Continent. Neither the race for the South Pole in the early 1900's or the explorations of the 1930's brought the amount of understanding of the continent experienced during the IGY. Through cooperative agreements, twelve countries with research stations on the ice (36) or neighboring islands (19) provided the following advancements:

- A new value for total abundance of water in the form of ice on the Antarctic continent. 90% of the planet's ice is found on and around the continent, locking 68% of the world's fresh water in the Southern Hemisphere.
- Improver meteorological predictions by understanding the weather patterns of the Southern Hemisphere.
- * Advancements in the theoretical analysis of glaciers.
- * Seismology on the Southern Hemisphere.

The cooperation in Antarctica paved the way for the Antarctic Treaty. Signed December 1, 1959, the treaty created a continent free from nuclear weapons and open to scientific research, the first truly "international" territory. By 1996, forty-one nations, representing more than 80% of the world's population, had signed the treaty. Twenty-seven of those are full voting members of the treaty organization. Any changes or alterations to the treaty requires unanimous agreement of all 27 voting members.

Philatelically, the International Geophysical Year created untold opportunities for collectors. Stamps, cachets, organizations like the National Science Foundation, ships, bases and stations, and individual program participants produced an untold volume of items to fill volumes of materials. In the ensuing years more items have become available, such as those related to the Antarctic Treaty, construction of new, technologically advanced research stations, the International Polar Year 2007-08, and much more. In the months to follow, I hope to illustrate the possibilities by sharing items related to the IGY.

Canada did not send a team to Antarctica during the IGY. Instead, Canada conducted scientific research on specimens collected and returned by other groups. Canada's IGY stamp features a microscope (research) with the symbol of the IGY, the globe, in the background.



On October 8, 1958, Haiti issued a set of seven stamps and a souvenir sheet of 4 to commemorate the IGY. Haiti did not participate in the activities of the IGY in the Antarctic or at home, not did it send any equipment or personnel. These issues had no significance for the program and therefore was rejected by the American Philatelic Society.
