

U.S. Fancy Cancels 1890-1900 – the Sol Salkind approach (Part 2) by Bob Burney

A few years ago, I was fortunate to purchase a stock book full of fancy cancels that belonged to the late Sol Salkind, along with a few covers to foreign countries with international franking and fancy cancels. I'm always looking for the more difficult designs at shows or on eBay, as long as the seller's prices are not unrealistic, and at shows, asking dealers for bags, or envelopes containing bulk 2¢ reds. That's the least inexpensive way to collect them. Here is the "order of process" I use for working with these stamps:

- obtaining material
- sorting (separating the wheat from the chaff)
- washing and drying (three stages: soak, dry, press until flat)
- identification and research (books from personal library or APRL)
- tab write-up and stock book mounting (working album)
- album page mounting

Here are the custom tabs I created to document information about each fancy cancel in my collection:



My stamps showing fancy cancels are placed inside clear plastic stamp mounts that will be eventually be placed on an album page, temporarily slid over the white square with ruled border in my custom tabs (see sample above). The catalog identification is hand-written next to the cataloguer's name (Salkind, Cole, Billing, etal.) like OB-FL-7, which can be found in Salkind's book under Section XI under Objects (OB), and Various, or Flags (FL). The number (7) follows numerical order of the different flag patterns catalogued by Salkind. The category is defined as "Flags". I also pencil-in the "Price Paid", identifying "Notes", the cancel's color (black, violet, etc.), and Scott catalog data from the chart in this article, pertaining to the stamp's nomenclature in the Scott Specialized catalog. Sometimes, the same, or similar pattern is identified by a different cataloguer. In my example, I've found a similar pattern in Cole's book and added it to the tab for future reference. If you're paying attention, you've noticed that the fancy cancel example in the tab is not a flag, but instead called a jack-o-lantern, pumpkin, or boogie man.

Perhaps the best way to collect fancy cancels is to purchase envelopes with the stamp and fancy cancel design intact. I've see some at stamp shows offered as "on-piece", where the stamp, fancy cancel, and complete postal cancel was intact. Those should be less expensive than fancies on entire covers and are often cheaper than fancy cancels on individual stamps. Be careful here. As with many classic philatelic interests, deception should always be on your mind. When expensive fancy cancel designs are purchased, buy from a reputable stamp dealer, and ask if the stamp comes with a "cert" (certification). If someone could make a buck from a fake, usually found on the more expensive designs, you better believe they're out there, all the more reason to ask for a "cert."

When using Sol Salkind's catalog, I'm often confused by the designs he calls "Rosettes" and "Cogwheels". There is very little difference between the two designs. I've found many designs not called out in his work, definitely on stamps produced from the 1890s to 1900s that are not recorded.

Some could be fakes, but I suspect few truly are. The broad expanse of designs is contributed to few, if any regulations from the post office system on who at the post office could create fancy cancels or their design restrictions ... very decorative, attractive geometrics were created from New York main post offices to denote outgoing foreign mail. Just try to find a few of those for a couple of bucks! Good luck. Keep in mind that some designs used before 1890 remained in use after 1900, some appearing in Cole's catalog. The naming of designs was never standardized between different catalog authors, so Salkind may name a particular design by a different one than Cole, or vice versa, or they may use completely different names for a similar design. That can become a bit confusing for the perfectionist-philatelist. Salkind includes a section in his catalog for precancels and machine cancels. This is where I draw the line, discounting both as not in the fancy cancel arena. There is a place for them ... each in their respective categories.

I'm always looking for new tools to help me identify stamps and cancels for my US collection. Some years ago, while studying fancy cancels, I landed on photographic transparency filters, in different shades of red, and sometimes yellow or orange, made from polyester film, and other types of thin (.05 mm — 2 mil thick) plastic filters made for photography, sold sometimes as "color gel" filters. You'll find many on the market sold by Amazon and photographic suppliers in different thicknesses, colors and sizes, some in sheets that can be cut into smaller pieces to share with club members. I use one of the .05 mm red sheet films, about 3x5-1/2 inches and a red COKIN color light filter (much thicker) marked as a BW4. Sometimes my COKIN yellow BW1, and orange BW, also intensify handstamp fancy cancels allowing me to see them better for identification. Stay away from green, purple, and other dark color filters because they don't do a good job ... experiment with different color shades to see what works best for you. The best though, are red shades like filter #23A, and thinner films are easier to add to a stock book or album page for keeping with your collection or transporting to the MPS Sunday breakfast. Yes, this tool works on all types of handstamp cancels in black, violet, and similar shades on US postmarks prior to the 1900s, before machine cancels appeared for use at post offices throughout the country. You might try these filters on foreign stamps too. As a reminder, different manufacturers of photographic filters have their own numbering system for color filters. I use COKIN but there are many others.

Which club members collect U.S. Fancy Cancels? Please share your knowledge with me. Do you have any "Waterbury" fancy cancels? Write an article for the newsletter or better yet, come to Sunday breakfast and bring your material. There are about seven or eight MPS club members that meet most Sunday mornings between 8 to 8:30 a.m. and stay at the restaurant until 11:00 or sometimes longer ...

The restaurant is called Winsteads, located at I-435 and Roe Avenue. We have a separate meeting area in the room at your immediate left when entering through the main doors. And, not only is this a MPS club meeting – we've been holding meetings for early risers there for over twelve years! A raffle is offered to club members the third Sunday of each month. Come and have some fun!




Ireland #2102 St. Patrick's Day


Irish immigrants in the U.S. turned it into a secular holiday of revelry and celebration of all things Irish.

The International Geophysical Year, Part 3 by Michael Keil:



The *Investor's Reader* was a publication put out by the firm of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fener, and Beane. It was "a news and educational publication about financial and business matters." The February 5, 1958 issue was devoted entirely to the IGY, explaining various aspects of the research into the weather, space, health, and Antarctic exploration.

Although not making specific investment recommendations, the lead article states, "Participating in the vast endeavor are a number of prominent companies....In addition thousands of large and small firms furnish their products or services to one or another of the IGY under-takings; the U.S. Antarctic program alone was supplied by over 4,000 companies." Over 200 specific companies are identified throughout this issue, just an FYI, I guess.



Although the *Investor's Reader* does not specifically address stamp collecting, images of stamps issued for the IGY can be found on several pages in this issue, starting with page 1. A not-so-subtle suggestion that IGY stamps might be a good investment?

Pictured on page 1 are issues from the Australian Antarctic Territory, Japan, and Belgium.



Issued in 1958 to commemorate the International Geophysical Year, the *La Araucana* stamps of Chile feature a map showing the Chilean claim sector in Antarctica. *La Araucana* is a 16th century epic poem about the Spanish conquest of southern Chile by Alonso de Erecilla. It is considered a national epic and one of the finest poems of the Spanish Golden Age. The poem describes the initial phase of the Arauco War which would shape the economics, politics, and social life of Chile for centuries. The poem also contains one of the earliest Spanish references to Antarctica.

"Chile, that fertile and marked province,

In the famous Antarctic region."

The stamps also reference Decree 1747 which was signed November 6, 1940 by President Pedro Aguirre Cerda. The decree states "All lands, islands, reefs, rocks, glaciers, already known, or yet to be discovered, in their respective territorial waters, in the sector between longitudes 53 and 90 west of Greenwich, constitute the Chilean Antarctic or Chilean Antarctic Territory."
