

This value was part of a group of new issues produced in mid-1941 (perhaps August) to meet current postal rate changes. The purpose of the stamp is puzzling because there was only one established 5c rate: the 100 g sample rate between cities. The value works easily as a "rate maker" and when fulfilling the 8c letter rate.




Double Perf. in Margin, Group 3 Inspector's mark 'C' on back selvage

Produced to meet increasing domestic letter rate increases effective September 20, 1940. The value was printed in large quantities from 40 different plates due to heavy usage. Workmanship is good and there are only a few noticeable retouches.

Brown Orange

Colors are very close to that of the 5¢ value and can be found in a wide range of shades: 1) orange (yellow-orange tone), 2) deep orange (less yellowish cast), and 3) brown orange (more brownish). The brown orange seems to be a definite ink color although some of the darkness could be due to aging or chemical changes of the inking solutions (oxidation). The orange ink used by the Commercial Press was somewhat unstable.

June 6, 1940, Domestic Express to Changsha (Hengyang), Hunan, received June 7, forwarded to Kweiyang June 24, arrived June 25, returned to Changsha, June 25

One of the first Hong Kong Martyrs to emerge, it may have seen service as early as June 1940, with the watermarked version appearing in May of the following year. This value paid the combined letter rate and service fee for ordinary express letters. It was one of the building blocks which led to parcel post franking. Production is thought to be high, but the rate change of September 20, 1940 raised letter rates to 8¢ and express fees to 15¢.

Produced to meet the registration rate for local, domestic, Japanese, and Korean mail effective September 20, 1940. The stamp is notorious for plate varieties. Almost all express and registered covers from this time period carry smaller value franking. When a cover is found with a "solo" 13¢ value, it is usually from a commercial enterprise. Few of these values were used.



Mar. 1943, Canton Province, Nanking, registered airmail with Calcutta censor tape, to US, received Mar. 12

This exceptionally difficult to find cover traveled from the Republic of China to the United States using the services of three air carriers: China National Aviation Corporation (CNAC), British Overseas Airways Corporation (BOAC), and Pan American Airlines (PAA). The CNAC began the journey from Nanking's post office and flew to Calcutta (India) where it was opened for censor inspection. It then transferred to the BOAC's Horse-Shoe Route and West African Service via Leopoldville (Kinshasa), continued to Bathurst (Gambia) and Lagos (Niveria), where it was forwarded to PAA.

PanAm Foreign Air Mail Route 22 (FAM 22) West African Clipper Flying Boat Service flew from Lagos to Miami via Natal and Belem (Brazil), Post-of-Spain (Trinidad) and San Juan (Puerto Rico). The final leg of the journey was Miami to New York, all for a mere \$21.40.

International postcard single rate to Europe and USA, ordinary express letters to Macau and Hong Kong, and additional ounce fee for domestic letters.



Compared with other Hong Kong prints, the master die workmanship is inferior. Shading lines are badly spaced, under-drawn or over-cut. Spots, broken characters, and broken lines abound. This block of 36 clichès demonstrates 6 different major transfer varieties that appear in two locations on every pane of 200.





20¢ Hong Kong Print - Huang Hsing

The only stamp in the Hong Kong series to repeat the design of the Peking production, but in a different color. It was used to meet the need for paying registered express service beginning September 20, 1940. This was also a useful value for satisfying foreign letter and parcel post fees and can frequently be found with foreign mail and parcel post cancellations. Many transfer varieties exist.
